In the presence of God, who gives life to all things, and of Christ Jesus, who in his testimony before Pontius Pilate made the good confession, I charge you to keep the commandment without spot or blame until the manifestation of our Lord Jesus Christ, which he will bring about at the right time - he who is the blessed and only Sovereign, the King of kings and Lord of lords. It is he alone who has immortality and dwells in unapproachable light, whom no one has ever seen or can see; to him be honor and eternal dominion. Amen.

As for those who in the present age are rich, command them not to be haughty, or to set their hopes on the uncertainty of riches, but rather on God who richly provides us with everything for our enjoyment. They are to do good, to be rich in good works, generous, and ready to share, thus storing up for themselves the treasure of a good foundation for the future, so that they may take hold of the life that really is life.

Sanctify us also that we may faithfully receive this holy Sacrament, and serve you in unity, constancy, and peace; and at the last day bring us with all your saints into the joy of your eternal kingdom.

All this we ask through your Son Jesus Christ. By him, and with him, and in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit all honor and glory is yours, Almighty Father, now and for ever. **AMEN**.

Communion is open to all baptized Christians, and for precautionary measures, only consecrated bread is distributed. If coming forward to receive the bread, please keep a respectful 6 foot distance from the people in front of you, if you do not live in the same dwelling.

To receive the bread, please extend your hands and keep them level. The priest will drop the wafer into your hands. Please take the bread back to your seat and consume it there, briefly moving your mask, to do so.

In Anglican liturgy, receiving bread is equivalent to receiving bread and wine.

The Prayer of Spiritual Communion (To be recited by people joining us on Zoom.)

Celebrant sets the pace.

In union, O Lord, with the faithful at every altar of your Church, where the Holy Eucharist is celebrated, we desire to offer you praise and thanksgiving. We present to you our souls and bodies with the earnest wish that we may always be united to you. And since we cannot now receive you sacramentally, we ask you to come spiritually into our hearts. We unite ourselves to you, and embrace you with all the affections of our souls. Let nothing ever separate you from us. May we live and die in your love. Amen.

Dear Faithful of St. Mark's:

This Sunday we welcome to St. Mark's our Regional Missionary, Maggie Breen. Father Pace will be our celebrant and homilist, but Maggie will be joining us for our regular coffee time following services to discuss all issues regional. This meeting is especially timely for us as the following Sunday (October 2) we commence our visiting of local parishes with an eye to merging. Maggie, obviously, is very familiar with all the parishes in our area and should be able to provide valuable insights. I hope as many as possible will join us for this important conversation in Cooper Hall following our services on Sunday.

On October 2 we will be celebrating the Eucharist with the community of St. James in Farmington. Please remember that on the visitation Sundays we will not be having services at 90 Main, although remote participation will be available for those who cannot attend in person. Two things, in particular, need to be noted. The first is that the time of the services at the parishes we will be visiting varies. The service at St. James, for instance, starts at 10:15 a.m. The second thing to keep in mind is that on the Sunday following our visit to any parish, the visit will be the focus of our conversation during coffee time the following Sunday at 90 Main Street.

We are in transition! That is unsettling for everyone, but change is more difficult for some than for others. In all of this, besides God's presence with us, there is something else that is certain.

Nothing is going to happen fast! Holding one's breath is not recommended.
