The First Lesson 2 Kings 5:1-3, 7-15c

Lector: Volunteer

A Reading from the Second book of Kings.

Naaman, commander of the army of the king of Aram, was a great man and in high favor with his master, because by him the LORD had given victory to Aram. The man, though a mighty warrior, suffered from leprosy. Now the Arameans on one of their raids had taken a young girl captive from the land of Israel, and she served Naaman's wife. She said to her mistress, "If only my lord were with the prophet who is in Samaria! He would cure him of his leprosy." When the king of Israel read the letter, he tore his clothes and said, "Am I God, to give death or life, that this man sends word to me to cure a man of his leprosy? Just look and see how he is trying to pick a quarrel with me."

But when Elisha the man of God heard that the king of Israel had torn his clothes, he sent a message to the king, "Why have you torn your clothes? Let him come to me, that he may learn that there is a prophet in Israel." So Naaman came with his horses and chariots, and halted at the entrance of Elisha's house. <sup>1</sup>Elisha sent a messenger to him, saying, "Go, wash in the Jordan seven times, and your flesh shall be restored and you shall be clean." But Naaman became angry and went away, saying, "I thought that for me he would surely come out, and stand and call on the name of the Lord his God, and would wave his hand over the spot, and cure the leprosy! Are not Abana and Pharpar, the rivers of Damascus, better than all the waters of Israel? Could I not wash in them, and be clean?" He turned and went away in a rage. But his servants approached and said to him, "Father, if the prophet had commanded you to do something difficult, would you not have done it? How much more, when all he said to you was, 'Wash, and be clean'?" So he went down and immersed himself seven times in the Jordan, according to the word of the man of God; his flesh was restored like the flesh of a young boy, and he was clean.

Then he returned to the man of God, he and all his company; he came and stood before him and said, "Now I know that there is no God in all the earth except in Israel."

## The Breaking of the Bread

Celebrant: Alleluia. Christ our Passover is sacrificed for us. **People:** Therefore let us keep the feast. Alleluia.

Celebrant: The Gifts of God for the People of God. Take them in remembrance that Christ died for you, and

feed on him in your hearts by faith, with thanksgiving.

**Communion** is open to all baptized Christians, and for precautionary measures, only consecrated bread is distributed. If coming forward to receive the bread, please keep a respectful 6 foot distance from the people in front of you, if you do not live in the same dwelling.

To receive the bread, please extend your hands and keep them level. The priest will drop the wafer into your hands. Please take the bread back to your seat and consume it there, briefly moving your mask, to do so.

In Anglican liturgy, receiving bread is equivalent to receiving bread and wine.

The Prayer of Spiritual Communion (To be recited by people joining us on Zoom.)

In union, O Lord, with the faithful at every altar of your Church, where the Holy Eucharist is celebrated, we desire to offer you praise and thanksgiving. We present to you our souls and bodies with the earnest wish that we may always be united to you. And since we cannot now receive you sacramentally, we ask you to come spiritually into our hearts. We unite ourselves to you, and embrace you with all the affections of our souls. Let nothing ever separate you from us. May we live and die in your love. Amen.

### **BISHOP-ELLECT GIFT FUND**

It is customary for the people of the diocese welcoming a new bishop to join in giving the new bishop various signs of the episcopal office and vestments they will use in their ministry. We are honored to be gifting Bishop-elect Jeff with his episcopal ring and purple set of vestments to be used during Advent and Lent on parish visitations.

The vestments are being designed and made by vestment artisan Patrick Boylan, out of Brooklyn, New York. The set will include a chasuble, two priest stoles and a deacon's stole. It will be accompanied by a plain white miter, the customary choice of miter for the Advent and Lenten seasons.

The episcopal ring is a traditional signet ring. It will feature the diocesan seal (in reverse) on its face and will be used to create wax seals. One side of the ring will have engraved on it an ox yoke, an important symbol from the Bishop-elect's years spent in ministry at the Episcopal Conference Centér in Pascoag, RI. The other side of the ring will feature a nutmeg branch, in reference to Connecticut as "The Nutmeg State." Together, they remind the Bishop-elect where his ministry began, and where it has sent him to serve.

The total cost of these gifts is \$12,000. Every gift amount is welcomed, no matter how big or small. We thank you for your generosity in welcoming our new bishop diocesan to the Episcopal Church in Connecticut!
