THE LION'S PAUSE with STEPHEN HARD, JUNIOR WARDEN

Spring has sprung! As I write, the forsythia and daffodils are ablaze, the trees are in full bud and soon we will be off! But to where? Spring and Summer in New England are predictable, but they always manage to surprise us. Somehow, we think that maybe, just maybe, this will be the year that winter just does not end. This bothers some folks so much they move to where they need not worry about winter ending—they move to where there is none! I prefer to live in hope. I like to be surprised, and because I am optimistic by nature, I expect that what the future holds will be better than anything I might imagine. In any case, our faith tells us that, ultimately, God is in charge and there is nothing to fear—not even death itself. There is an important lesson in God being in charge. We are not responsible for results, only effort.

This is very different from the calculations of business, politics, or even education. In those spheres results are *all* that matters. Positive, measurable, results are the reason for the existence of businesses, governments, and schools, and accountability for results is extraordinarily important. But in the realm of faith, the focus is, or is supposed to be, on faithfulness. Results are God's business. And consider what God pulled out of a crucifixion!

I do not know about you, but I feel as if I am treading water here at St. Mark's. Part of that is because the pandemic has divorced us from our weekly physical faith affirmation. Jesus gave us his body and blood to support and strengthen us because he knew we would need this. I never thought I would discover this the hard way. But it is not just the pandemic. Because our current circumstances are so surreal, I must remind myself that I am part of what is a dying parish. Before anyone gets upset at that last remark, I did not say we were dead. But even if we were, things coming back to life is a part of the Christian plan. How that will be manifest I have no clue, but I know that it will happen

Some of you know Archbishop Evelyn DeLeon who, for many years, rented space in our buildings and loves them as we do and wants to bring new life to them. It is a tall order, one that Right Now Ministries could not take on, and Bishop and Brigette Brown will be leaving our facilities to make room for United Chaplains.

There are still many things to be worked out, and a purchase and sale agreement is only a first step, but there are lessons here for us as a faith community no matter what transpires. If we have been and continue to be faithful, what happens next may not be what we hoped for or planned, but we can know that God has the results in hand. Like spring after the winter there will be surprises yet.

COVID-19 Funeral Assistance available from FEMA

FEMA has begun accepting applications for its program to assist families with the financial expenses of funerals for COVID-19 related deaths. The program will reimburse individuals and households for COVID-19 related funeral expenses incurred after Jan. 20, 2020. Assistance is limited to a maximum of \$9,000 per funeral and a maximum of \$35,500 per application. While the applicant must be a U.S. citizen, non-citizen national, or qualified alien, the deceased does not. Learn more about eligibility and how to apply on FEMA's COVID-19 Funeral Assistance page.

Episcopal Relief and Development has created a <u>fact sheet</u> for the program, as has <u>FEMA</u>, both of which can be helpful in responding to questions and helping guide people through the application process.

<u>২ জি০ ২ জি০ ২</u> Allison's Parish Clerk News Corner April 2021 Happy Spring! Happy Easter! I started last month's "corner" with the same greeting, but it is still true and even more so. The grass is green and growing and the flowering trees are blossoming. My bleeding heart plant joined my daffodils in my garden. God is smiling. God is smiling for St. Mark's Church too. Stephen Hard has executed the Purchase and Sale Agreement for our 147 West Main St. property with the United Chaplains. The sales price is \$600K with independent financing. Bishop DeLeon's lender will require a thorough inspection within 90 days. If all goes well, the closing should be in June/July. St. Mark's neighbors surrounding South Church are active community members and show us opportunities for ministry. 1. Stephen and Mark delivered 50 pounds of requested toiletries to the Cathedral for Hartford Community College students. 2. A Sunni Mosque and the CCSU downtown New Britain campus are around the corner. How might we connect? 3. The Friendship Center created a safer "friendship pod" by reducing the number of clients but allowing them to stay at the center 24/7 rather than requiring them to leave between 7 a.m. and 7 p.m. 4. A Triage Center at 57 Arch St. provided a warming shelter 6-10 p.m. daily from January 4th to March 31st. St. Mark's contributed \$500 to the project. 5. The Friendship Center hired a dozen people to staff the warming center and help the homeless find shelter at The Red Roof Inn. Local restaurants provided continental breakfasts. 6. South Church continues to make sack lunches, often with bread Mark provides. These are delivered to the Friendship Center. 7. St. Mark's Food Pantry is an integral part of the community. It has received a \$500 grant from Food Share for supplies and equipment. This will help fund the purchase of another freezer so we can store larger quantities of frozen food from Food Share. Barbara has been researching St. Mark's Church's history and our relationships not only with blacks and slavery but also with Native Americans. She has graced us with weekly chapters in our Sunday bulletins. She and Cheryl have published a leaflet, "Sleuthing for Slavery and Supremacy", soon to be distributed. This will be a wonderful starting point for discussion as we strive for racial justice and reconciliation. God Bless you. We are traveling the path of Jesus to do God's mission and be embraced in God's infinite love. Let's spread the Good News! Allison Penick

Dear friends in Christ,

April is giving way to May, and there are three things on my mind at the moment, of many that I could mention.

1) April showers bring May flowers. There is a special beauty of God's creation in the current flowers, as I look across our garden. My wife takes a focused interest in gardening. I continue to be impressed by her work. Praise God for gardeners, and for the flowers, God's handiwork.

2) Several people in the parish have been keeping in touch with other people via the phone, through cards, and in other ways. It is a really important ministry to each other. 3) And liturgically, there is the ministry of the Church calendar for us as a way to keeping in touch with God, as the people of God, particularly:

a) Ascension Day on Thursday May 13th, reminding us when Jesus Christ Ascended up into heaven to be seated at the right hand of God, interceding for us,

b) The Day of Pentecost on Sunday May 23 (another day for wearing red), reminding us of when God poured his Holy Spirit down on the gathering in Jerusalem, a key step in salvation for connecting us with God's empowerment, and

c) Trinity Sunday on Sunday May 30, reminding us of our connection with our God: Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.

A prayer: Heavenly Father, we ask that your Holy Spirit would empower us to do that which you have called us to do, and to be the people whom you have called us to be, that all would be done to your glory, in your way and in your time. In Jesus' Name we pray. Amen.
