#### **Moving Fences**

Alleluia! Christ is risen!

Yes, it is June and Pentecost is just around the corner, but I'm still basking in the glow of Easter. And we need to celebrate the gift of Jesus Christ every day. St. Mark's Easter Day this year was extraordinary. After 2 years of the Covid pandemic, selling our building and having Father Shaw complete his time with us, I felt bereft and ambivalent about our future. Yet, the day dawned with sunshine and we were blessed with a service in a flower-filled Erwin Chapel, an organist and Bishop Laura as our celebrant! I could not have asked for more......and, yet, there was! Bishop Laura's sermon touched my heart. She spoke of several World War II soldiers who wanted to give their friend who had been killed an honorable burial. They asked a priest at a local church if that was possible. He said, "No, one had to be a member of the church to be buried in its cemetery." He did bury the soldier just outside the cemetery's fence. After the war ended, the soldiers returned to visit the grave and could not find it. They asked the priest and he said that the grave was there *in* the cemetery. How could that be? The priest said, "I moved the fence."

Listening to Bishop Laura, (God bless her!), my heart melted. That is what Jesus would have done. That is what the world needs now. We need to move the fences we have built to exclude "the other". St. Mark's Church has been and continues to welcome everyone. "Open to God's Love-Serving our Neighbor." We are participating in ECCT's efforts for racial healing, justice and reconciliation. Our Community Ministries group is actively seeking ways to administer our Smith Fund to help those in need in New Britain. Not only do we have a food pantry, but we are contributing to the Friendship Center's new Day Center which will have a multitude of services from laundry and showers to a computer room and job search assistance. It is exciting! Our Easter celebration was the result of a talented team of organizers. In our outreach, we are part of a team in our community-working together without fences. Jesus Christ is at work everywhere inside us.

#### **Episcopal Peace Fellowship - Juneteenth Prayer (from Muddled Prayers)**

Almighty God – Father, Son, and Holy Spirit – we praise your name, for you alone are God. There is none like you, gracious and compassionate, slow to anger and abounding with covenantal faithfulness. You care for the orphans and widows and look upon the immigrant with affection. Your love is not threatened by the ways we diminish, marginalize, and destroy each other. There is no one like you.

You have made your faithfulness known from generation to generation. Throughout the biblical story, we hear again and again how you have continued to rescue your people, releasing them from bondage in order that they might live fully and freely as your children. We remember Moses and the Exodus. We remember the cycles of deliverance and repentance under the Judges. We remember the prophets and the returns from exile. And we remember how all of these have made known your generous love for the least of these. We recall most of all how you entered this story in the flesh, releasing us from our sins through Jesus Christ's life, death, and resurrection. You reconciled us with your self and in doing so you call us to be reconciled with one another. Through the Holy Spirit, you continue to tear down the dividing walls of hostility that separate us from each other and distort your gospel.

We add our voices to the generations that have gone before us in giving thanks for the freedom you brought in the United States when you brought slavery to a legal end. Over two hundred years of European-Americans shipping and trading African peoples as if they were disposable goods distorted our experience of your image both in those enslaved and in those who enslaved others. The abuses against aboriginal peoples, Asian immigrants, and countless others at the hands of European-Americans have deformed our cultures and diminished the flourishing life you intended for us to experience together. Yet, you have a history of overcoming our most dehumanizing abuses of each other, even when we legalize our abuses through our words of law and government sanctioned violence. Thank you for raising up faithful servants of your kingdom who boldly and prophetically embodied your gospel, spending themselves on behalf of those enslaved. Thank you for not abandoning us to our destructive ways. Thank you for releasing us from the legalized injustices we have inflicted upon each other. Thank you for your mercy and compassion, Lord.

In giving you thanks, we also remember with sad sobriety just how deep our lust for power, our hatred of those who are different than us, and our selfish desire for economic and material prosperity runs. Before you and with the testimony of those who have gone before us, we admit that our hearts are still bent toward our own comforts, especially when others bear the cost of our selfishness. While we have made slavery illegal, we continue to participate in systems, structures, and cultural patterns that provide advantages to those of us from European decent in ways that consistently diminish, distort, and destroy the lives of persons of color. Forgive us, Lord. Release us from the deceptive corruption that is in our hearts and in the patterns that we continue to pass along from generation to generation. In your compassion transform us that we might desire the flourishing of all people in the fullness of your grace.

In remembering the day in which the slaves in Texas finally heard of their emancipation, we cry out to you to bring all slavery to end. Bring an end to the enslavement of children as soldiers. Bring an end to the trafficking of women and children as objects for sexual abuse. Bring an end to enslavement and transportation of people across borders to work in factories, fields, and construction sites. While the visible slavery of centuries past has been dismantled, our enslavement and abuse of others continues. Open our eyes to these injustices and to the ways we contribute to them. Search us, O Lord, and call us into action to bring an end to the injustices that we continue to perpetrate against each other.

Jesus, as you intercede with the Father on our behalf, please remember those who are caught up in the entanglements of slavery – whether as victim or perpetrator. Teach us to pray with you. May you make us into one people who embody the Father's love in the ways we work for the mutual flourishing of each other. Holy Spirit, teach us to groan with you in longing for the fullness of your coming kingdom. May you equip us in your humble power to tangibly anticipate the day when Jesus Christ will complete his work of making all things new. Grant us the strength to spend ourselves on behalf of those who are still entangled in slavery so that together we might experience the full reconciliation and new life that you desire for all peoples.

We offer this prayer because our salvation comes from you alone, because you are already at work among us, releasing us from our sins, and because you are faithful. That your glory and honor might be made known through the freedom of all people. Amen.

#### **Broadcast Instructions**

Our service will always be available on Zoom with Meeting ID 500-865-037. You can enter via the parish Web link at <u>http://www.stmarksnewbritain.org</u>. Please either print or have the bulletin open on a separate browser tab to participate fully in the service. (For more information on the Zoom service, please go to the back page of the bulletin.)

If there is a significant negative change in the trajectory of the Covid-19 pandemic, we will switch to Zoom-only worship. An email will be sent out to the parish to alert everyone if the service is to be Zoom only.

In-person services at 90 Main Street continue to require that everyone wear a mask and maintain a safe distance inside the buildings of South Church. Masks will be available for those who need them. Thank you.

If you are using a telephone to dial into the service: dial the zoom phone number, and then wait to be prompted by the voice to enter the meeting number. Then, enter the meeting number, and as part of the meeting number, please add the "pound" sign (#) at the end of the meeting number (as the verbal instructions direct).

The Zoom broadcast opens at 9:45 am when remote participants can be admitted and will be greeted by the e-verger.

Remote participants are encouraged to stay connected after the service and greet and be greeted during the coffee hour.

#### WE HAVE A NEW BISHOP DIOCESAN-ELECT! Barbara Campbell, Treasurer

The Rev. Jeffrey Mello was elected on the 6th ballot Saturday, May 21, 2022. Now the rest of the dioceses in the Episcopal Church in the United States and Province 9 (like Honduras, and Europe where we have a Cathedral in Paris) have 120 days to concur with our vote. If that happens, the Rt. Rev. Michael Curry and at least 2 other bishops will consecrate Jeffrey Mello as the 16th Bishop Diocesan of Connecticut on October 15, 2022.

Now how did this happen? You remember about Sam Seabury sailing back to England after the Revolutionary War, telling the Archbishop of Canterbury the church in America needed its own bishop. The English bishops said, "No!" to that impudent colony of America, so Sam Seabury went up to Scotland. There the bishops listened, said "Yes" and three of them consecrated Seabury, with the agreement that the American Book of Common Prayer would more closely resemble the Scottish BCP than the English one.


But in the here and now, when Bishop Ian Douglas announced his retirement, a Bishop Transition Committee was formed, followed the prescribed application process and became very nimble at it as a week's worth of Meet and Greets were supposed to be in person around the diocese. Covid prevailed so they were on YouTube and handled very nicely. Combined with listening to sermons by the candidates, hearing their responses to different questions at 3 Meet and Greets, and reading their applications, I felt I knew quite a bit about each candidate.

How did they do? Stephen Hard went to the Hartford Convention Center to vote in person for St. Mark's with 405 other people. Voting is by order so a successful candidate needs 50% plus one of the clergy vote and 50% plus one of the lay vote. On the first ballot, Whitney Altopp, a petition candidate and rector of St. Stephen's Church in Ridgefield, CT received only 3% of the total vote and withdrew. On the second ballot, Glenna Huber from Washington D.C. received only 8% of the total vote and she withdrew. On the third ballot, none of the 3 candidates received one plus the majority by order. On the fourth ballot, Kate Moorehead from Jacksonville, FL did receive 2 more than she needed from the lay vote. On the fifth ballot, Jeffrey Mello received enough clergy ballots but not enough lay votes and Tanya Wallace from South Hadley, MA withdrew. On the sixth ballot, both clergy and lay voter gather around Jeff Mello, the winner!

Our Bishop Elect Jeffrey Mello has been Rector of St. Paul's in Brookline, MA for 13 years. He is a person of joy who sees life through a pastoral lens. He grew up with 4 brothers knowing he wanted to be a priest, a husband and a Dad. In college he saw himself as gay, met Paul in 1992 and in 1995, they had a commitment service. In 2000, they brought their now 21 year old son home from Guatemala. Jeff never thought he would be a hockey Dad and now he is!

At St. Paul's, he has focused on outreach, social action and lay leadership. He has served as a Clinical Social Worker at Mass. General Hospital and taught as an adjunct at Episcopal Divinity School. He is Chaplain to the Brookline Fire Department.
