THE LION'S PAUSE with STEPHEN HARD, SENIOR WARDEN

Dear St. Mark's Parishioners,

The mission trip to De la Gracia Parish in Andreas, Dominican Republic was wonderful. I could write a book. Instead, I will limit myself to bathrooms and the Bible.

We went to build a bathroom, but the bathroom was not the point. The bathroom is part of a larger plan to have a permanent church, and other facilities, on the property to promote the mission of the Episcopal Church. But they do things a bit differently in the DR. Climate-wise, everything is not always "under one roof" and, of course, none of our extensive provisions for freezing temperatures matter at all. Culture-wise, the word that comes to mind is incrementalism. We tend to have a plan, raise the money or the financing, and then quickly implement the plan. That's akin to the "under one roof" approach, and it's not how they operate. They have a sense of what they want to achieve, and then take steps to bring about what they want in ways that seem disorganized and inefficient. Our way of doing things seems far superior, and lack of money is the only thing preventing Dominicans from doing things our (the right, better, superior) way. The trouble is that the solution (money/wealth) is also a problem.

Money provides many desirable things. It provides security. It provides independence, and it can insulate us from dealing with what is unpleasant. But it can also diminish experiencing and living many of the important values of our faith. Dominicans living in impoverished circumstances, and all poor people, do not have the luxury of focusing on the future as we do. You may have heard of Abraham Maslow's "Hierarchy of Needs." Maslow makes the very important point that human beings, for the most part, don't focus on higher-order needs (self-esteem, selfactualization) if lower order needs (physiological, safety, and relational needs) are not met. Dorothy Day put it succinctly: "Nobody wants to kiss when they are hungry."

What I discovered was that impoverished Dominicans demonstrate the presence of God in all of life and that their very poverty challenges us and the way we live our faith. Rather than propped at the top of the hierarchy of needs, God is there from top to bottom. And God is an incrementalist.

Summer Sunday Services

For a variety of reasons associated with our plans to merge with St. James in Farmington,

it will not always be possible to offer Sunday Services in the Erwin Chapel. On these

Sundays, parishioners are encouraged to attend the Sunday Eucharist at St. James in Farmington to promote our getting to know one another and becoming more comfortable worshiping there. Through Labor Day, St. James' one service is at 9:30 a.m. This is livestreamed via FACEBOOK LIVE. Livestream connection is by clicking the "F" icon at the top of the St. James Webpage. After Labor Day there are two services.

Rite 1 is celebrated at 8:00 am, Rite 2 (normally with choir) is celebrated at 10:15 am. Only the 10:15 am service is livestreamed.

A parking tip: When approaching the church turn right just in front of the entrance. Parking to the left (behind the church) is difficult and limited. Across the street from the front door of the church there is ample parking available on Sunday mornings.

Parking at 90 Main St.

South Church has begun their Summer Service times. Their Sunday Service will begin at 9:25 a.m. in the Main Sanctuary. This will make parking very difficult. There will be a spots reserved for St. Mark's. They will be near the entrance at the "bottom" of the parking lot.

Look for the traffic cones with ST. MARK'S on them. However, if you are able, please park either on the street or in the parking garage next to the police station. Thank you.
